
So, what does a person do when they retire? Yes, of course, we decided to travel and went to visit my brother Steve on the East Coast.

Another trip was to Hawaii. Robert and Christy had moved there so Rob could attend BYU Hawaii. So we decided we should visit them.







There were no tour buses coming to the Visitors Centre.






most of those coming were temple patrons.

An exciting event that occurred in May of 2004 was our son Spencer's wedding to Lisa Marie Castro. They had met as students at Cal Poly University and had fallen in love. The wedding was held in the Catholic Church in Pleasanton, California. I felt that my responsibilities at the Visitors Centre were so great that I could not attend the wedding but Cecile was able to go. She left New Zealand on May 17 and returned on May 26. Scott designed the invitation for

them.



When Cecile returned she brought Lora with her. Lora wanted to serve a mission and had submitted her papers to the Santa Rosa Stake President, Perry Bingham. She stayed with us until her call came on 26 June 2004 to serve in the Texas Fort Worth Mission. She was to report at the Provo MTC on August 4.

Cecile and I had a wonderful set of missionaries assigned to the Visitors Centre. Some were full time couples and others were local part time couples and older single Sisters. We also had at least two fulltime Sister Missionaries who were temporarily assigned to us and would then return to other locations. We became attached to every one

of them.

With such wonderful missionaries at the Visitors Centre, the question was "How do we get more people to come here?" We did set up a series of Sunday evening firesides but this wasn't enough. We felt the answer might be a pageant celebrating the 150 year history of the Church in New Zealand. Since Cecile had produced a similar pageant in California, we felt it could be done again here.

She wrote a script and we sent it to the Area Presidency for approval. We changed a few things at their request to make it fit a broader scope of cultures in New Zealand and not be "too Maori." A director was called named Sheryl Butters. She was a daughter of Mihi Strother who hd been brought into the Church by Grandma Delma and her husband Leroy Bott.

We had difficulty working with Sheryl because she wanted a much longer pageant. So we compromised and it went on for four nights in September 2004 at the Hamilton City Theater with a cast of about 400. In the end over 4,000 people attended and were inspired by the show.



A Visitor Centre missionary with a special story was Sister Enna Taulanga from Tonga. Her father and mother were not members of the Church and her father left the family when she was nine years old. He moved to Auckland, New Zealand to live. Enna and her mother later joined the Church and eventually Enna was called on a mission to serve in the Auckland Mission.

I received a phone call from President Arthur of the Tamaki Stake in Auckland to say that Sister Taulanga's father was then investigating the Church and was coming on a Stake bus excursion to the Temple and the Visitors Centre. He asked if I could arrange for to meet his daughter. We had Sister Taulanga bear her testimony and then she was allowed to embrace her father. It was a tender mercy.

Each of the five performances were held in the Visitors Centre and drew large crowds. Through the windows the audience could see the beauty of the Temple behind the actors. Each cast came from many different cultures but they were excellent in their part. It was a bit like "Just-In-Time" production because we would be writing the next script while performing the one before it.

History of early Church presented in New Zealand




Through hymns and words from prominent members, taken from journals and early histories of the Church, performers in New Zealand present readers' theater about life of Joseph Smith.

After a visit to South Island, we returned home.

In the year we returned home there were several funerals of friends and family members. One who died before we reached home was Cecile's nephew, Ron Hirschi. He was the victim of an accident who was riding his bicycle when he was hit by a truck. It seemed that he was much too young to be taken away.

In addition Cecile's sister-in-law Lorna James passed away. Then, in Santa Rosa our Tongan friend Seteki Fakalata suddenly died. He was only 50 years old and was a counselor in the Stake Presidency. Then he was followed by our friend Jack Hershey who we had first known in Los Altos and then had also moved to Santa Rosa.

The biggest surprise came when our friend Reed Ogden died. He had been the Santa Rosa Stake President whom I replaced. We had known Reed and Beverly when we were at BYU and he was on the Honor Council. Reed had been seriously injured in an automobile accident in 1993 a few months after he was released and though he lived another 13 years, he had never fully recovered. They were living in Alpine, Utah when he passed away. Following the funeral Beverly held an open-house for old Santa Rosa friends who had also moved to Utah. We were there even though we had not yet moved.

Then in 1980 she was called to serve a mission in England. Her father, cartoonist Charles Schulz (of Peanuts fame) came and spoke at her mission farewell. On her mission Amy met Elder Johnson. They were attracted to each other so when his mission was over he wrote to Amy and proposed marriage. Her mission president released her early so she could go home to be married. They then lived in Alpine with their nine children.



While we were living in New Zealand Gina was living in our rental house in Santa Rosa. However, after she remarried the house was too small for them all. So, in April 2006 she held a final party at the house and they moved into a larger home in Windsor, California. The rental had tripled in value while we were gone and we did not want to pay the capital gain tax. So we decided to purchase a place in Utah on a "1031 Exchange." Since we were selling a rental the requirement was that the place we purchased also had to be a rental for at least two years.

When we discovered the home in Elk Ridge, the owner agreed to sell it to us and that he would rent it back for at least one year. Then we had to find another renter for the second year. In that second year we didn't rent the basement apartment so we were able to stay in it when we came to visit.

To Doug . . . With love, from Cecile (2 June 2014)


The time has come for one last word Of all the poetry you've heard. A "Love Poem" I will now compose To Doug - and this is how it goes . . .
