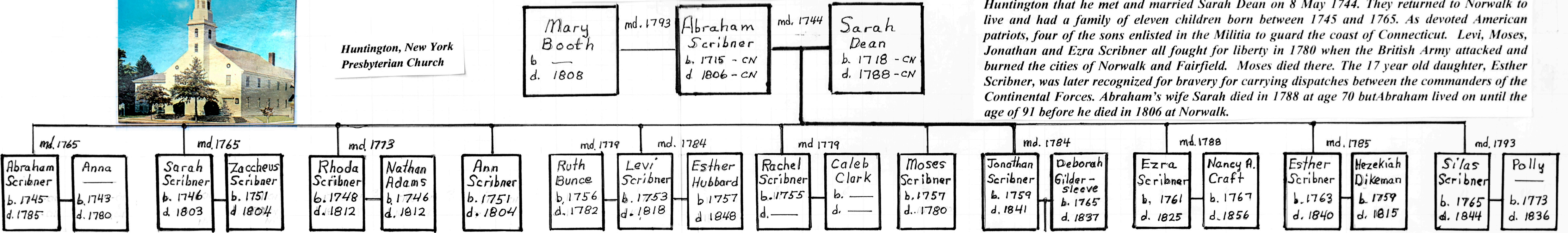

300 Year Scribner History

Abraham Scribner was born in 1715 at Norwalk, Fairfield, Connecticut to Benjamin and Abigail Scribner. Norwalk is across the Long Island Sound from Huntington, New York. It was in Huntington that he met and married Sarah Dean on 8 May 1744. They returned to Norwalk to live and had a family of eleven children born between 1745 and 1765. As devoted American patriots, four of the sons enlisted in the Militia to guard the coast of Connecticut. Levi, Moses, Jonathan and Ezra Scribner all fought for liberty in 1780 when the British Army attacked and burned the cities of Norwalk and Fairfield. Moses died there. The 17 year old daughter, Esther Scribner, was later recognized for bravery for carrying dispatches between the commanders of the Continental Forces. Abraham's wife Sarah died in 1788 at age 70 but Abraham lived on until the age of 91 before he died in 1806 at Norwalk.



Abraham Scribner Jr., born 1745 in Norwalk, married Anna in 1765 and had seven children. Anna died in 1780, at age 37, when their last child was born. Abe died in 1785 at age 40. The children were raised by their grandfather.

Sarah Scribner, born 15 Oct. 1746 in Norwalk, married a second cousin Zaccheus Scribner from Ballston, Saratoga, New York. They had eight children but she died in 1803, age 57. He died a year later so the children were raised by his family.

Rhoda Scribner, born 18 Oct. 1748 in Norwalk, married Nathan Adams in 1772. They settled in Weston and raised eight children til 1792 when they moved to Salem, Westchester, New York. Rhoda and Nathan both died in 1812 at Salem.

Ann Scribner, born 1751 in Norwalk, married Levi Scribner in 1779. They had seven children. In 1806 they moved to upstate New York near his brother Jonathan until Levi's death in 1818.

Ruth Scribner, born 1756 in Norwalk, married Caleb Clark in 1779. They remained in Berkshire until 1790 and had four children.

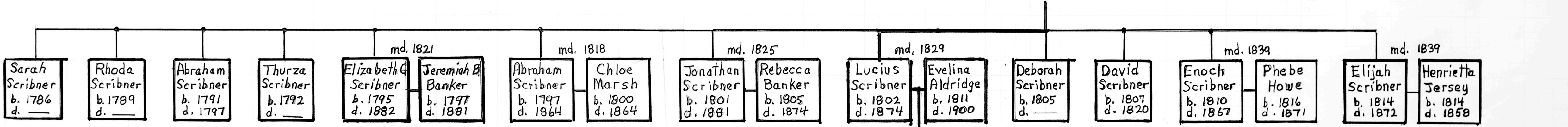
Rachel Scribner, born 1755 in Norwalk, married Deborah Gilderleeve in May 1784 at Huntington, New York and moved to Plattsburgh, on the edge of Lake Champlain in 1794.

Jonathan Scribner, born 1759 in Norwalk, was seventeen in 1776. He lived on the edge of the Long Island Sound when the British army attacked in 1781. He wed Deborah Gilderleeve in May 1784 at Huntington, New York and moved to Plattsburgh, on the edge of Lake Champlain in 1794.

Ezra Scribner, born 19 June 1761 in Norwalk, fought with Connecticut Militia in 1781. He then married Nancy Anna Craft 25 May 1788 and they had two daughters. Ezra died in Norwalk in 1825 but Nancy lived in N.Y. until 1856, age 89.

Esther Scribner, born 1763 in Norwalk, carried dispatches for Militia Officers in 1781. She married Hezekiah Dikeman 13 Oct. 1785 and had four children. Hezekiah died 13 Jan. 1815 in Westport, CN. Esther then moved to Ashtabula Ohio in 1819. She died 4 July 1840.

Silas Scribner, born 15 Sept. 1765 in Norwalk, was too young to fight in the war. He married Polly in 1793. They soon moved to Cairo, Greene, New York and had three children. Polly died in Cairo on 10 May 1836 at 63 years. Silas died in September 1844 at 79.



Sarah Scribner, born 26 Dec. 1786 in Norwalk, and Rhoda Scribner, born 20 February 1788, Huntington, New York, apparently stayed with Deborah's parents when Jonathan moved to Plattsburgh New York in 1794.

Abraham Scribner, born 3 January 1789, and Thurza Scribner, born 4 October 1792, both in Huntington, did travel to upstate New York with Jonathan and Deborah in 1794. Abraham died there in 1797, age eight. Thurza was there in 1800 but gone by 1810.

Elizabeth Gilderleeve Scribner, born 10 May 1795 on their farm near Plattsburgh, married Jeremiah Baker Banker on 16 August 1821. They had 3 children. Jeremiah, born 9 Oct. 1797, died 21 August 1881. Elizabeth died 19 January 1882.

Abraham Scribner (2nd) was born 24 October 1797. He married Chloe Marsh in Plattsburgh on 27 Nov. 1817. They had five children born. In 1832 they then moved to Darby, Madison, Ohio where five children were born. Abe and Chloe died at Darby in 1864.

Jonathan Scribner Jr., was born 25 June 1801 in Beekmantown, near Plattsburgh. He wed Rebecca Banker, sister of Jeremiah Banker, 22 Sept. 1825 and had four children. Rebecca, born 30 June 1805, died 26 Sept. 1874 but Jonathan lived until 21 Mar. 1881.

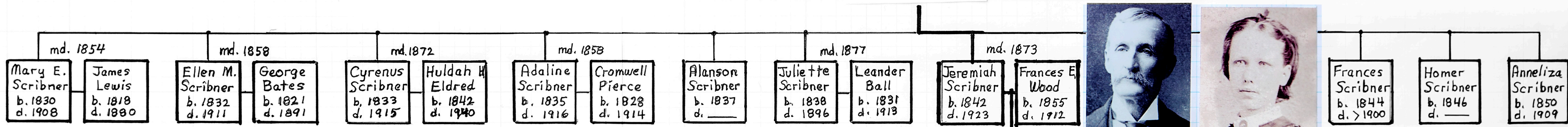
Lucius Scribner, born 10 Oct. 1802, lived in Beekmantown. He wed 18 year old Evelina Aldridge in 1829. They had ten children, all required to work on the farm. When Evelina was sixty, she left Lucius to live in Leominster, Worcester, Mass. He died in 1874 but she lived until 19 Dec. 1900.

Enoch Scribner, born 6 June 1810, wed Phebe Howe at Beekmantown in 1839. They had three children. Enoch died 18 November 1869 and Phebe died in 1871.

Elijah Scribner, born 3 January 1814, married Henriette Jersey in 1839 and had three children, but she died in 1858. He then married Diadema Pierce who died in childbirth. Finally Elijah wed Alice Moore in 1860 and they had one child. He died in 1872 but Alice lived until 1911.



Mary E. Scribner, born Nov. 1830, wed James Lewis in 1854 and had two children. He died in 1880 but she died in Boston, 17 Feb. 1908.

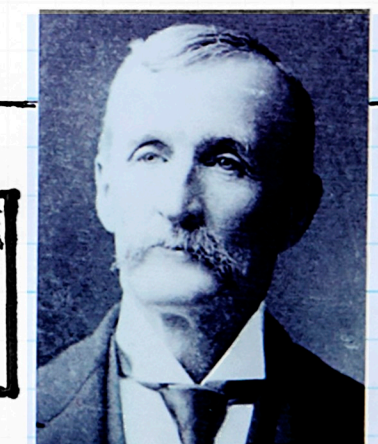
Ellen M. Scribner, born 1832, married George Bates in 1858 and had five children. He died in 1891 but she also died in Boston, 5 April 1911.

Cyrenus M Scribner was born 18 Sept. 1833. His first wife died so he wed Huldah Eldred in 1872 and had two children. He died 25 August 1915.

Adaline Scribner, born 27 June 1835, married Cromwell Pierce in 1858 and had 3 children. He died near Boston, 1914 and she died there, 1916.

Juliette Scribner, born 1838, joined her sisters in Mass. where she met and married Leander G. Ball in 1877 at age 39. She died 1 Nov. 1896.

Jeremiah Banker Scribner, born 15 March 1842, left home at age 20 for Peru, Illinois where he met and married Frances Elizabeth Wood in 1873. They moved to Oshkosh, Winnebago, Wisc. where they raised four sons. She died in San Diego, Calif. 24 Jan. 1912. He died there 6 Feb. 1923.

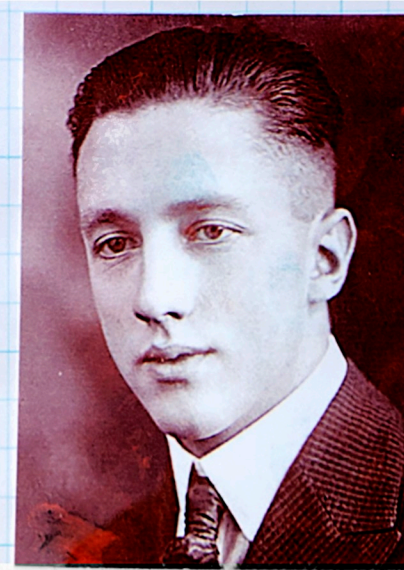
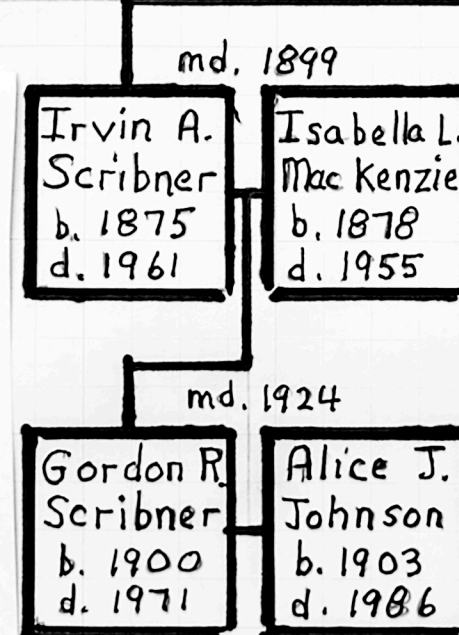


Frances and Anneliza Scribner, born in 1844 and 1850, also left home and moved to Mass. with their mother and older sisters. They never wed but died in Leominster, Worcester, Massachusetts about 1909.

Irvin Aldridge Scribner, born 6 June 1875, grew up in Oshkosh, Wisc. There he met Isabella Livingstone MacKenzie, whose family came from Scotland. They wed 24 August 1899 and moved to Green Bay where he was a jeweler. In 1905 they moved to San Diego, California with their son Gordon. Ella died there in 1955 but Irvin lived there until 4 May 1961.



Gordon Raymond Scribner born 26 July 1900, grew up in San Diego. After Navy service, he met Alice Jane Johnson in Oakland. They wed 7 June 1924. As an optometrist, he moved his practice back to San Diego in 1939. He died 27 Feb. 1971. Alice lived until 12 Feb. 1986.



Herbert Franklin Scribner born 13 Aug. 1877 Peru, Ill. wed Lillie Dale Cooper in Colorado 15 Nov. 1905. He died in 1946 Calif. but Lillie lived to be 101.

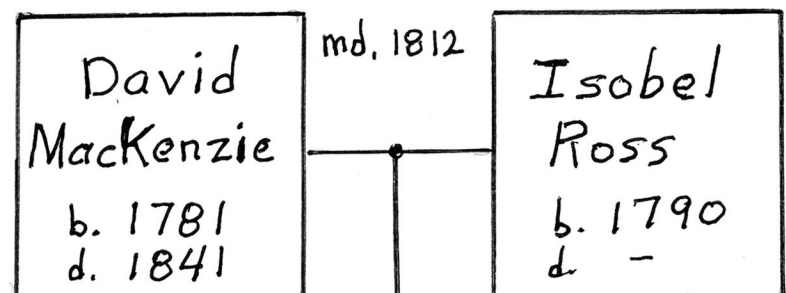
Jerry Banker Scribner, born 9 Nov. 1879, lived in Oshkosh. Blind in one eye, Jerry wed Nora Helen Fenton and worked as pianist until he died, 1952.

Jesse Earl Scribner, born 1 Feb. 1885 married his cousin, Edith Grace Wood in 1910 in Racine, Wisc. He died 17 April 1933 in San Diego. Edith in 1947.

Scotland Ancestors

David MacKenzie was born in 1781 in Cromarty, Scotland east of Inverness. He married Isobel Stronach and had two children but she died at age 30. David then married Isobel Ross in the Tarbat Parish located on the tip of a small peninsula jutting into the North Sea. David was a poor farmer so they lived in a "Wee Crofter's Cottage" by the villages of Geanies and Balnaha where they had four more children. The youngest of these were Roderick, born 30 March 1817, and Samuel, born 1 June 1819. Though poor, they were proud of their Highland Clan heritage.

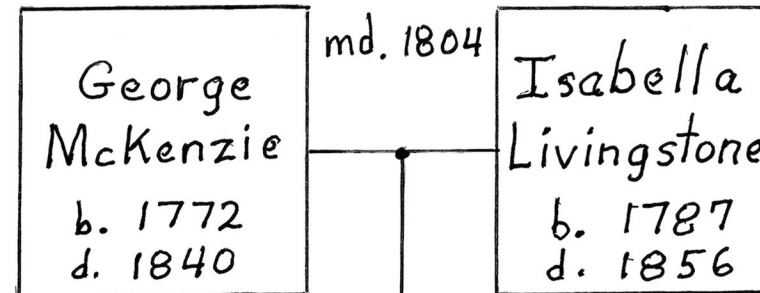


Delma in Crofter's Cottage

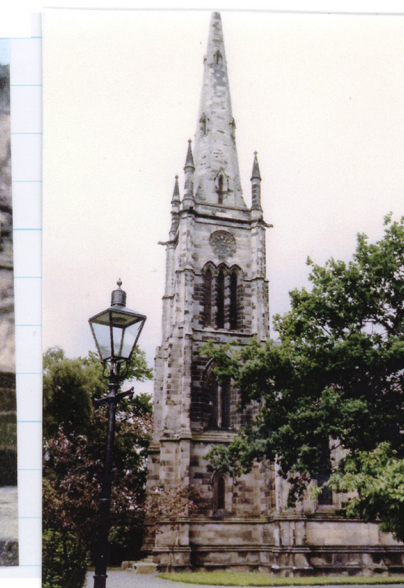
Lowlands



George McKenzie was born in 1772 in Dalkeith, Midlothian, Scotland and became a carpenter by trade. He married Isabella Livingstone 8 July 1804 in the village of Humbie, East Lothian near the burgh of Haddington. This region of Scotland is known as the Lowlands, close to the capitol city Edinburgh, and is mainly associated with coal mining. George and Isabella had nine children. Their seventh child, James McKenzie, was born 1 August 1815. James and his younger brother William worked in the coal mines.



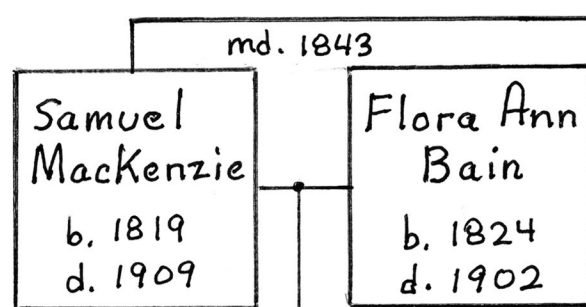
Edinburgh Tatro

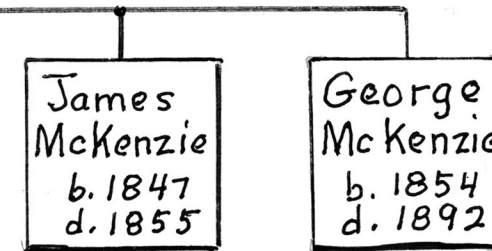
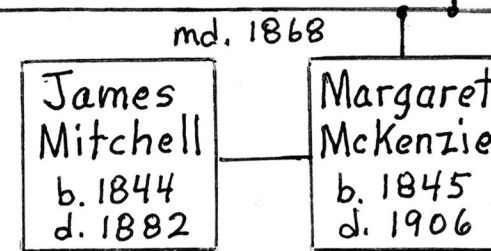
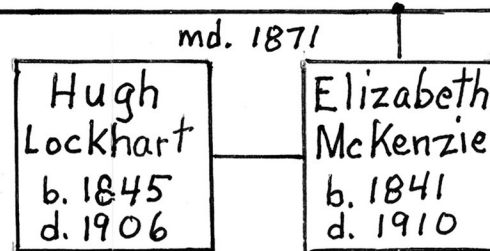
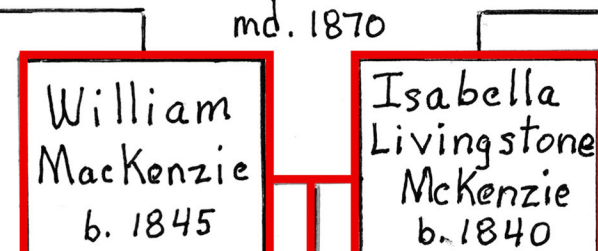
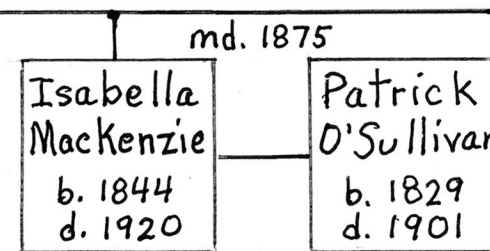
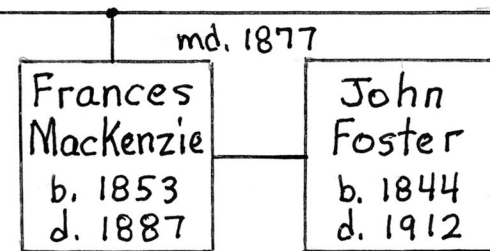
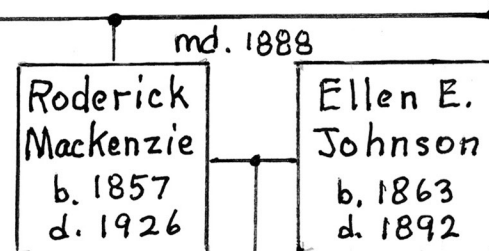
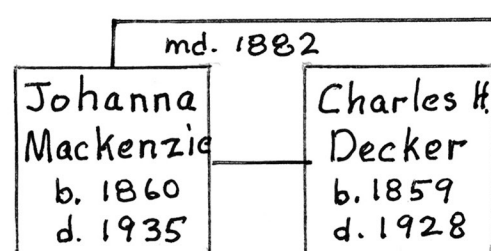
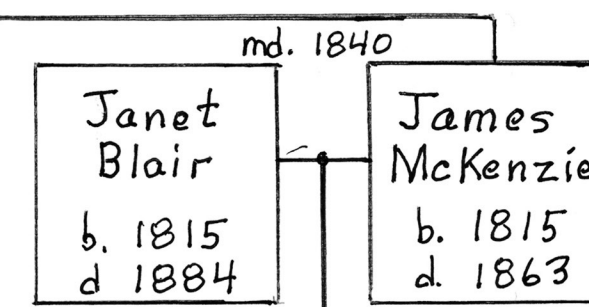


Samuel and Flora MacKenzie with three oldest children at New Orleans in 1853.



Samuel MacKenzie and his wife Flora Ann Bain were married in 1843 at Inverness. Their first two children, Isabella and William, were born in Scotland while Samuel worked as a policeman in Arbroath. They then moved to America and lived in New Orleans for seven years where Frances was born. They returned to Scotland where Samuel worked as a gamekeeper at the Strathbran Lodge. Two more children, Roderick and Johanna were born there. In 1872 Samuel and his family, without William, emigrated to Omro, Wisconsin, in America where they remained.

James McKenzie and his wife Janet Blair were married in Dalkeith on 27 March 1840 when they were both 19 years old. James worked in the coal mines nearby. They had seven children but only four lived to maturity. James died in 1855 when only forty years old but Janet lived another 29 years as a widow. Their oldest daughter was Isabella Livingstone MacKenzie.



William and Isabella Livingstone (Bella) MacKenzie, had three children born in Scotland: Allan Morrison, Isabella Livingstone (Ella), and William George MacKenzie. They, along with Bella's younger brother George McKenzie, sailed from Glasgow for America on 22 September 1882, arriving in New York October sixth.

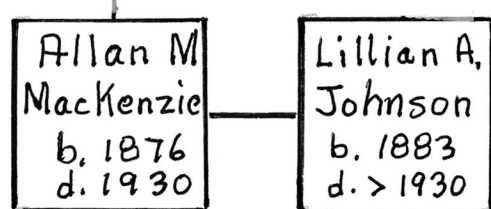


Gledfield House

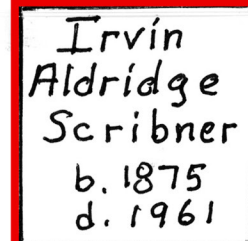
William MacKenzie married Isabella MacKenzie in Dalkeith, Scotland in 1870. They lived on a highland estate, the Gledfield House, where he worked as a gamekeeper. They had three children before moving to America in 1882. They joined his uncle Roderick on his farm in Algoma, Wisconsin where they lived until Bella died in 1906. Then William moved to San Diego near his daughter Ella.



Ella MacKenzie (age 14)



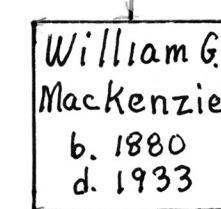
Irvin Aldridge Scribner, born 6 June 1875, was the oldest of four sons born to Jeremiah Banker Scribner and Frances Elizabeth Wood. He married Ella MacKenzie in Oshkosh, Wisconsin on 24 August 1899. Irvin became an expert jeweler. He and Ella with their son Gordon then moved to San Diego, California to live.



Gordon Scribner (age 12)



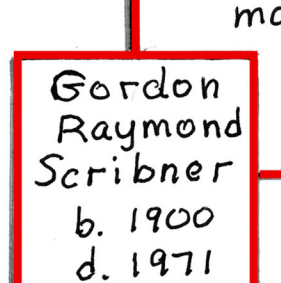

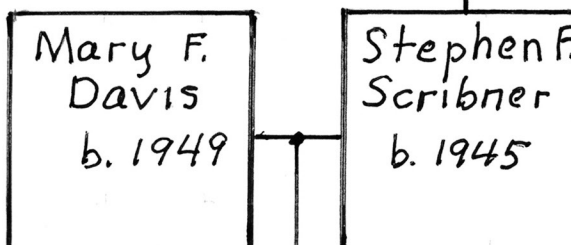
William MacKenzie
